He Has Risen!

Easter Sunday 2019

What does it mean that Jesus rose from death? We hear the story every year on Easter Sunday but its familiarity can cause us to lose sight of its impact across our existence. How does this event affect our person and our world? For starters, we grieve the loss of the ones we love but as scripture reminds, "you will weep and mourn for a time, but then your grief will be turned to joy". We will see them again. Death is not final. Christ and all with him live forever. Shocking but true, once we heal and surrender our loved ones to his greater life.

David Brooks, the eminent *New York Times* columnist, in a recent essay adapted from a forthcoming book, has observed that most people construct two mountains with their lives. The first mountain is their striving to prove themselves with worldly accomplishments and a related lifestyle. The second occurs when there is some disruption to this linear plan they've adopted for their success—a loss, a failure, a catastrophic upheaval, which becomes the catalyst for self-reflection, soul-searching, and new insights. Out of bad, good happens. Out of loss, hope is enabled. These personal discoveries often involve the honest admission that for all their striving, happiness, contentment and fulfillment has eluded them.

What happens next is often a period of reflection and re-invention—of the focus of their identity, core purpose and efforts, followed by a re-creation and transformation of their self. Brooks wisely opines that what's present for most of them is a hunger for true joy and true fulfillment, that despite all their striving, hasn't been sated.

How can Jesus' defeat of death, and his presence alive in us, change that? Our emptiness can make room for his life to fill us, our superficial pursuits can surrender to what's more important, our individualism can be uprooted by our longing for communion and community. Ambition and success, prized by our culture, can give way to practicing values of honesty, compassion, and kindness. The result: a kinder, more loving, more moral and just society, where the bonds of friendship, love, and connection with others are celebrated and prized over individualism and ambition. Happiness is often elusive and short-lived; genuine joy is found when we give ourselves away in commitment and unconditional love.

What is all this if not the radiance of the Risen Lord revealed among us in the divine sunshine of his love, goodness, and embrace of all humanity inviting us to this life in him.

Today and every day may we heed our Redeemer back from death, and find true, real and lasting life in him—for us, for our world.

A blessed and joyous Easter celebration of endless hope and eternal love in the Victorious Son is wished for you and all you love.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

As we walk on our life journeys in this world, we may often feel overwhelmed. Struggle and suffering can mark our lives because of health issues, job insecurity, family concerns, or the painful loss of a loved one. The world itself, in Saint Paul's words, "has been groaning" (Roman 8:22), as it struggles with wars, violence, ecological degradation, economic injustice, and natural disasters. And as we are keenly aware this past year, the Church herself has struggled mightily with the shameful legacy of abuse and its mismanagement.

It seems that the landscape of our lives is entirely shaped by struggle and suffering. And that might seem to be the sum and substance of it all, but, in faith, we know that it is not. Our celebration of the Lord's Resurrection in this Easter season opens our eyes beyond this desperate landscape to a new and hope-filled horizon. There is more to the story than our struggle and suffering. In the Resurrection of Jesus, we can begin to see a new life ahead of us that God offers to us.

As we go forth in this Easter season, I am reminded of the great Psalm 118 that the Church so often prays:

*I was thrust down, thrust down and falling,
but the Lord was my helper.
The Lord is my strength and my song;
and has been my savior.
There are shouts of joy and victory
in the tents of the just. (vv. 13-15)*

May this Easter season renew within you and your loved ones the conviction that God is your helper and an abiding awareness of your victory in the Risen Lord Jesus.

Persevering in Pursuit of Jesus

The key to our faith is the testimony of the apostles who witnessed Jesus resurrected from the dead. For this reason, the Easter scriptural passages carefully record who saw him, when, and under what circumstances.

Particularly powerful is the testimony of Mary Magdalene. She was at the foot of the cross with Mary and John. She saw Jesus' passion and death in all its brutal reality: carrying the cross, the nailing, spearing, his last agonizing words, lowering his body from the cross, cleaning his corpse, and anointing it according to Jewish customs. She would have wrapped him in linen and then stood outside the tomb as soldiers sealed it shut. She, more than anyone, could testify that he was most definitely dead.

Imagine her surprise when, early Sunday morning, she found the stone rolled away and the tomb empty.

After Peter and John came to confirm that it was as she said, Mary Magdalene stayed at the tomb. Having been forgiven much, she loved much. Saint Gregory the Great comments that the woman who stayed behind to seek Christ was the only one to see him, for perseverance is essential to any good deed.


Often we need to persevere in pursuing Jesus. He doesn't reveal himself to mere curiosity seekers. Rather, he rewards those who seek him with sincerity and who have accepted him deeply.

Jesus would find the person who was seeking him. He called her by name because he knew her as no one else. She had found her lost treasure and held on to it with all her loving strength.
